

East Brunswick 'spiritualist/author' self-publishes book

EAST BRUNSWICK — Deborah Simpson's latest book, "The Constellation of Omens," reads like snippets of Edgar Cayce, Nostradamus and the Book of Revelations mixed together for easy reading in a New Age paperback.

But the thoughts very much belong to Simpson, who has created a dark, foreboding, rambling collection of essays that lay out an apocalyptic vision of forces of good and evil at war in a potential future conflict.

Simpson, who graduated from East Brunswick High School in 1989, is a self-described "spiritualist/author."

In "The Constellation of Omens," she shares her thoughts on spirituality and God and warns of things like a one-world government and creeping, big-brother totalitarianism that has the potential to erode freedoms, obliterate democracy and reinstitute slavery on a global scale.

A pararegal by trade, she self-published the book using the print-on-demand Web site www.Julu.com.

"I lived through everything in the book when I wrote it, which means I wrote about visions I saw, heard or felt in the extreme," said Simpson, who claims to have been clairvoyant since childhood.

"My most recent book deals with the fundamentality of life," she said. "It deals with dispelling the myth that the end of the world is coming in 2012. It



also encourages unity under God, encourages bringing back the fundamental core of humanity and getting away from the focus of greed and politics that the world has come to."

Simpson grew up in East Brunswick in a Russian Orthodox family and was told at an early age that her burgeoning visions, energy sensitivity and insights into people's thoughts were "the Devil" and to be ignored.

She said her writing began about her visions, which continued to grow

stronger and culminated in five books (four self-published) and the creation of two poetry anthologies. Simpson also does psychic readings, teaches poetry and collaborates with artists in multiple mediums on a regular basis.

Simpson feels that her latest book is less of prophecy than a prediction of what could happen if mankind continues on what she feels is a self-destructive path.

"It's up to mankind as a whole," she said. "Every-

thing is our choice. Nothing that I wrote in this book has to happen. I would be content with the book being a total work of fiction."
